#### **Deadline for Banquet Registration**

- 2. Telephone the WAAST office at (228) 22 25 06 63. Again, give your name and spouse's name, if attending.

#### Former WAAST President Ted Schultz with the Lord

Theodore "Ted" Schultz passed away at his home in Hattiesburg, MS, USA, on 3 September 2011 at the age of 89. Rev. Schultz and his wife, Laura, began their missionary work in 1950. They served for 22 years in Dahomey (now Benin) before coming to WAAST in 1972. He was on the committee to find land for the school and on its first Board of Governors. He served as a professor and Academic Dean before assuming the President's post in 1980. He held this position until 1986, when he and Laura retired.

Rev. Schultz's heart never left WAAST. He made several visits over the years, and when Radio Jesus Loves You began broadcasting over the Internet in August 2010, he listened joyfully to

the sounds of "home."

Mrs. Schultz preceded her husband to heaven in 2004, and at that time the family asked that memorial gifts be sent to support Benin's Bible institute in Dassa-Zoumé. On the occasion of Rev. Schultz's homegoing, the family has requested that gifts be sent to the WAAST Scholarship Fund. We thank God for the lives of this couple and for their exemplary commitment to the Lord and to His work in Africa.
